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A Message from the Co-Directors of the Rowan Center for Responsible Leadership



The Great Chernobyl Acceleration: Environment and Health in the Nuclear Age


Tuesday, September 28th - 86 attendees

Kathleen leads Conservation Capital's Business Consulting Africa division. Kathleen brings 25 years of experience in integrated large landscape conservation programs in Africa and North America. Kathleen was a senior staff member of the African Wildlife Foundation for 11 years, now serving as Vice President for its East and Southern Africa portfolio. She has helped create new conservation areas, improve management of existing protected areas, established co-management arrangements with governments, and designed innovative models for community integration in conservation. She has completed dozens of land transactions in North America and worked extensively on increasing conservation finance for protected areas.




RCRL Open Mic Night, Vol. 1

A Conversation with Janelle Knox-Hayes

Monday, December 6th – 79 attendees & 13 YouTube views as of 07/17/2022 The Center hosted a conversation with guest speaker Janelle Knox-Hayes, the Lister Brothers Associate Professor of Economic Geography and Planning in the Department of Urban Studies and Planning. She holds a visiting research fellowship at the Smith School of Enterprise and the Environment at Oxford University. Her research focuses on the ways in which social and environmental systems are governed under changing temporal and spatial scales as a consequence of globalization. She has studied the political and economic interface of financial markets and environmental systems and how individuals and organizations plan and make decisions under conditions of socio-economic uncertainty. Her latest project examines how social values shape sustainable development.

The Center hosted guest speakers Irene Petrosillo, Thu Nguyen, and Kate Torgerson to discuss to impact of golf courses on biodiversity. Golf courses occupy considerable land area around the world. While intensive management practices to maintain golf courses undoubtedly change ecosystems and habitats, could it also be possible for golf courses to contribute positively to sustainability, and particularly, biodiversity goals? The event focused on two research projects and a professional practice of examining this question, as a starting point for considering how course design and maintenance practices can be modified to support healthier habitats and enhanced biodiversity.

RCRL Teaching Fellows

The mission of the Center is to support the values of social responsibility, sustainability, and organizational ethics among students, faculty, and community partners through the implementation of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals and the Principles of Responsible Management Education. The RCRL Teaching Fellows program is to help faculty integrate discussion, assignments, and analysis of responsible leadership focus areas into their courses. Teaching Fellows develop 'learning modules' – collections of pedagogical materials focused on a single issue, concept, or question – that can be readily adapted and integrated by college faculty into their courses.

In 2022, the Rowan Center for Responsible Leadership supported Teaching Fellows: Dr. Ted Howell (Dept. of Writing Arts & Dept. of Geography) and Dr. Rick Jonsen (Dept. of Management).

Dr. Ted Howell's Project - "A Climate Policy Primer": Introduces students to a top-level overview of climate change solutions and their costs/benefits through the lens of market-based policy interventions. Designed specifically as a 75-minute module that can be plugged-in to a class period by any instructor, the module features two engaging and interactive tools: the En-ROADS Climate Simulator and the YouTube video "How We Fix the Climate" by "vlogbrother," author, and TikTok personality Hank Green.

Dr. Rick Jonsen's Project - "Business Policy as Responsible Leadership: Integrating Sustainability OER into the Strategy Curriculum": Identifies and develops cases, discussions, teaching notes, and other open-source education resources (OER) for integrating SDG-based sustainability concepts into the reading, discussions, and assignments throughout the semester for undergraduate capstone business policy/strategy courses.
